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## Summer Reading Book Bag Report Guidelines

### **Directions for completing the Book Bag Report project:**

**Step 1:** Select one book to read from the list provided within this document, or if you have a book of interest that is not on this list, you may read it.

**Step 2:** Obtain a large paper grocery bag from your local grocery store.

**Step 3:** Design one side of your bag as the book's cover with your favorite scene, a redesign of the original cover, or a computer printed version of the original cover.

**Step 4:** Type your book report using these guidelines which are also on the rubric:

- ✓ Type your paper.
- ✓ Font Size = 12 pt.
- ✓ Font Style = Arial, Georgia, or Times New Roman
- ✓ Spacing = 1 to 1½ inch spacing between lines and paragraphs
- ✓ Margins = 1 inch (top, bottom, left, and right)
- ✓ Header (Name, Date, ELA7 or ELA8) in Top Right Corner
- ✓ Minimum and maximum sentences per paragraph for your grade level:
  - 7<sup>th</sup> Grade: 6 minimum – 8 maximum sentences per paragraph
  - 8<sup>th</sup> Grade: 8 minimum – 10 maximum sentences per paragraph

**Step 5:** Find five (5) items to represent important details from your book and put the items in your bag.

**Please follow the RUBRIC** within this packet for required content for each paragraph of your report and the other elements necessary for your book report so that you have success with getting a passing grade!

Instructions	Points Possible	Points Earned
<p><b>Front Cover of the bag must have a colored illustration.</b> You can draw an image to represent your favorite scene from the book, or you can redesign the book's cover. The cover must be presentable and appropriate.</p>	10	
<p><b>Five (5) Items relevant to my summary:</b> Find five items that reflect important details from your book to put in your bag. When you present your summary, you will tell the audience why these items are important.</p>	10	
<p><b>Plot Summary: Write to summarize the elements of the plot for the book.</b> <b>1<sup>st</sup> paragraph:</b> Explain the setting (where the story takes place and time). Introduce the main character(s) and other <i>important</i> characters in the story. Include the name(s), character's qualities/traits (e.g., brave, determined, etc.) and how they exhibit that trait. Discuss the conflict or problem the main character faces in the story. If you struggle with this section, ask yourself these questions: who, what, when, where, why, and how.</p>	10	
<p><b>2<sup>nd</sup> paragraph:</b> Summarize what happens up until the high point of the story, also known as the climax, where the character changes in some way or the problem is resolved. Use some transition words to help you organize the events of the story.</p>	15	
<p><b>3<sup>rd</sup> paragraph:</b> Summarize the ending of the book. Include how the problem is resolved, if it is resolved; or, tell us if there is a cliffhanger. Provide at least one theme of the book. Remember, the theme is the message, or lesson, the story teaches.</p>	15	
<p><b>Opinion and Rating of the Book</b> <b>4<sup>th</sup> paragraph:</b> Write a paragraph giving your opinion of the book and rate it on a scale of 1 - 5. Use the following guidelines: 1) Did you like or dislike the book? Why? 2) Was the book confusing? If so, why? 3) Was it too easy or too hard to read? Why? 4) Was it predictable or believable? Why? 4) Did you like the ending? Why or why not? 5) What was your favorite part? Why? 6) What connections did you make with your life, another text, or the real-world? 7) What did you think of the author's style of writing? Provide examples from the book to support your responses to these questions.</p>	10	
<p><b>Glossary (on a separate page):</b> Vocabulary is an important part of reading. Making note of as well as using the words you read will help you grow as a reader. List at least five (5) words that were new to you or words you think are worth mentioning. Then, define each word and use it in a sentence of your own to demonstrate your understanding of the word.</p>	15 <i>(3 pts each)</i>	
<p><b>Format:</b> Was the format followed?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>✓ Typed, 12 pt. font using Times New Roman, Georgia, or Arial; 1-inch margins (all around)</li> <li>✓ Header (Name, Date, and ELA7 or ELA8)</li> <li>✓ Paragraphs with minimum number of sentences as required</li> </ul>	15	
<p><b>Presentation:</b> You will present your book report in class so prepare yourself by reading and rereading your report. Practice in the mirror or in front of your parents, a sibling, or a friend.</p>	15	
<p><b>Mechanics:</b> 1 pt. deduction for each error in the following areas: capitalization, use of incorrect grammar, punctuation, spelling, and sentence structure (CUPS).</p>
